So many wonderful and challenging things have happened at EPIC the past few months. Here are a few of the highlights.

Our 26th Annual Dinner was a huge success.

Thanks to everyone's generosity, but especially to PNC Bank and Mercy Health who were our Gold sponsors, we cleared almost \$10,000 dollars this year! From the delicious food from Power Inspires Progress to the gentle music, it was an absolutely delightful evening.

We've had our challenges too. The sewer line connecting EPIC to the City's lines over time has filled with debris (this is a very old home remember) causing sewage to back up into the house. Of course this happened on a Sunday night. Three bedrooms, part of the laundry room, the staff's bathroom and a hallway were all affected.

What could have been an absolute nightmare was not, due to the thoughtfulness of the contractors we work with. Monday morning I called Berg-Berry, our insurance company and on Tues., Jay Land, the adjustor from Philadelphia Insurance Company was at EPIC. By Wed. Roto Rooter had cleared the sewer line, cleaned and sanitized everything. Then the plumbing had to be done and new flooring laid. Butch Thiel from United Carpet Outlet worked his installers' schedule around our needs and in two weeks everything was back to normal at EPIC with a minimum of upset to our residents.

We have such great support from everyone; it's just a matter of letting EPIC's Friends know our needs and someone steps in to help Thank you to every single person who helps EPIC. We appreciate each and every one of you.

We continue to be blessed with spiritual, financial and volunteer support but it costs \$1650 a month to provide a home for each resident and most are able to pay only \$877, which includes funding from the state. We do rely heavily on donations and volunteers to help make up the shortfall. Every job from preparing a meal to taking care of the house and yard is one less line item in our budget.
